



A MESSAGE FROM

Hello and welcome to the first edition of the Town of Abita Springs quarterly magazine! We hope this publication will bring current events to the forefront so that everyone will be informed and able to enjoy them to the fullest. We've been hard at work on many projects. I've highlighted just a few of them below.

TECHNOLOGY

Technology abounds all through the town; we've installed 1,660 feet of twelve-lead fiber optic cable from the town hall to the park, enabling us to provide free Wi-Fi along that route. We've also enhanced our music capabilities in the park and installed new high-resolution cameras for security and videography of events. This allows people to participate in events from the comfort of their homes! The October 2021 Abita Busker Festival with Tuba Skinny has over 119,000 views. We've completely changed our website and we post a variety of information from our different departments for your viewing. We live-stream town meetings making it easier for you to stay in touch. Please find us on YouTube! We have been working hard to keep the Town current and vibrant, keeping pace with technology in the 21st century.

PUBLIC AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

We have initiated the following activities as part of our public relations campaign to assist the public in becoming more engaged.

- **Town App** - My team and I are in the process of creating an app for smartphones that will have push notifications for boil water advisories, town meetings, weather alerts, and other town events.
- **Public Notices** - We are posting signs, placed on-site, to notify the community of upcoming Public Hearings. Public Hearings Notices are also posted on the Town Facebook page.
- **Meetings**- Town Meetings are advertised on our Facebook Page and on the Town Center Sign.

SEWER PROJECT

The Town has assumed control of several non-compliant private septic systems connecting them to our gravity sewer system to prevent further infiltration into the river. In doing so we were able to secure a 12.5-acre parcel of property doubling the size of our public green space.

When I took office, the Sewer Project was in the works. Prior to initiating improvements, we refined the bid specifications to allow for more of the system to be repaired at a lower cost. This review and the changes made resulted in a better project and saved over \$800,000, now dedicated to correcting other pressing sewer plant deficiencies.


Our wastewater plant is over 30 years old. Unfortunately, environmental conditions and past inadequate maintenance have taken a toll. Plans include completely draining the plant. This will allow us to determine the extent of damage to the components and find out the best approach to move forward, allowing us to keep up with current and expanded needs.

ENLARGING OUR PARK


As we touched on in the "Sewer Project" section, the Town acquired an additional 12.5 acres of green space. The scenic parcel runs along the river from the Trailhead Park all the way to Cypress Street. Considerations for the property include the installation of walking paths with educational signs identifying native trees and vegetation. This idea originated after discussions with the Nature Conservancy related to the acquisition of additional scenic property bordering our new park property. The Conservancy has agreed to work with the Town to accomplish its educational and preservation objectives.

I have very fond memories, growing up in Abita, and as a young boy playing in the river waters. We would swim in the river all day. One of our favorite places was a rope swing at a spot we called gravel bottom. This beautiful natural place is now owned by the residents of this community and will be preserved as part of our park. I'm grateful for the opportunity to protect this area for future generations to enjoy.



OPEN HOUSE

We are planning an open house for the community to see our new office space! We are still getting organized but stay tuned for more information including dates and times. During Town Hall renovations, we discovered the original beadboard walls; the restoration of the original beadboard helps to preserve the building's historic character. We were also able to reuse the pecky cypress in the Annex, which visitors tell us have turned out beautifully. I am pleased to be able to provide the Town's hardworking staff with a safe and clean working environment. Take the opportunity to come see the offices. We are honored and humbled to be able to work for the great people of the Town of Abita Springs!

In 2017, the Garden Club worked with Keep Abita Beautiful and the Town of Abita Springs and won the Cleanest City Contest the first time we entered!





Check to see if the property or house you are interested in is located in the Town Limits of Abita Springs. Property located outside of the town limits will fall under the jurisdiction of St. Tammany Parish.



HOW TO TELL IF PROPERTY IS IN THE TOWN LIMITS

Check the Assessment Number. If your assessment number starts with 115 then the property is in the town limits. Visit the [Assessors Office Website](#).

DETERMINE ZONING

Call us at (985) 892-0711, Option 4 for the Planning and Zoning Department. After we determine the zoning for the property you will know your options for building or development.



PROPERTY ZONED HISTORIC?

If your property is zoned historic you will need a COA ([Certificate of Appropriateness](#)) to build or make changes to an existing site. A certificate can be gained by filling out an application and coming before the [Historic Commission](#).

UNSURE IF IMPROVEMENTS REQUIRE A BUILDING PERMIT?



Drop Box: Please start using our new drop box located on the front left corner of the new building.

Address: Please make sure your address is clearly posted at your home. 911 recommends address numbers be displayed in a location visible from the road. Not only is this important for 911, but also for our Utility Workers when trying to locate your home.

UPDATE ACCOUNT INFORMATION: SOME RESIDENTS HAVE ACCOUNT CONTACT INFORMATION THAT HASN'T BEEN UPDATED SINCE OUR AREA CODE WAS 504. THIS MIGHT NOT SEEM LIKE AN ISSUE UNTIL WE NEED TO CONTACT YOU ABOUT A LATE BILL OR A WATER LEAK.

Disconnect Policy:

- Utility bills go out on or near the 10th of each month.
- The day after the due date, late fees are applied.
- Disconnect notification door hangers go out once your bill has a past due amount. Disconnect notice will have a date that payment is due by, or payment arrangement is made with the utility office.
- No account will be allowed to be more than one month past due.
- Once services are disconnected the total bill, plus \$35.00 reconnect fee is due to have services turned back on. We cannot accept checks. Payments must be cash or money order.

ACCEPTABLE METHODS OF UTILITY PAYMENTS

EPAY (Paperless) - Our electronic billing and payment application offers a convenient and easy way for customers to view and pay their utility bills online. Customers will be charged a transaction fee of \$0.35 plus 3% of the balance. If you are interested in receiving E-Bills, please go to our website to enroll at www.townofabitasprings.com or call our Utility Office for more information at 985-892-0711.

ACH (Auto Draft) - Enroll in ACH to automatically debit your bank account for monthly utility bills. This enables the Town to have a regular collection of payments and automated posting of payments to customers' utility accounts. Go to townofabitasprings.com click on the tab - I Want To - Set Up Utilities - Direct Payment Authorization Form, or you can pick up a form at the Town Utility office.

FISERV (Check Free Electronic Payments) - Utility payments that are made through your bank via email to us. There is no fee for this service. Every day we receive an email with all bank electronic payments that we process daily. There is no waiting for payments that may be delivered late causing you to be charged a late fee. Bank checks sent via United Postal Service are subject to late fees if they are received after the due date. This service is done between you and your bank, not through the Town of Abita Springs. Contact your Bank and ask how to start sending check-free electronic payments.

DROP BOX - Personal checks, cashier checks, or money orders can be put in our drop box on the front porch of Town Hall or our new drop box on the annex on Live Oak (see photo.) PLEASE DO NOT PUT CASH IN THE DROP BOX.

DID YOU KNOW?

Your sewer bill is calculated based on your water usage. If your sewer bill increased it is because your water bill did also.

THE DROP BOX ON THE FRONT PORCH WILL BE CHECKED THROUGH THE END OF JULY. PLEASE USE OUR NEW DROP BOX EXCLUSIVELY AFTER JULY 31ST.




WHAT TO LOOK FOR

WHAT TO DO?

HEAT STROKE

- High body temperature (103° or higher)
 - Hot, red, dry or damp skin
 - Fast, strong pulse
 - Headaches
 - Dizziness
 - Nausea
 - Confusion
 - Losing consciousness (passing out)
- Call 911 right away-heat stroke is a medical emergency
 - Move the person to a cooler place
 - Help lower the person's temperature with cool clothes or a cool bath
 - Do not give the person anything to drink

HEAT EXHAUSTION

- Heavy sweating
 - Cold, pale and clammy skin
 - Fast, weak pulse
 - Nausea or vomiting
 - Muscle Cramps
 - Tiredness or weakness
 - Dizziness
 - Headache
 - Fainting (passing out)
- Move to a cool place
 - Loosen your clothes
 - Put cool, wet cloths on your body or take a cool bath
 - Sip water
- Get medical help right away if:**
- You are throwing up
 - Your symptoms get worse
 - Your symptoms last long than 1 hour

HEAT CRAMPS

- Heavy sweating during intense exercise
 - Muscle pain or spasms
- Stop physical activity and move to a cool place
 - Drink water or a sports drink
 - Wait for cramps to go away before you do any more physical activity.
- Get medical help right away if:**
- Cramps last long than 1 hour
 - You're on a low-sodium diet
 - You have heart problems

SUNBURN

- Painful, red and warm skin
 - Blisters on the skin
- Stay out of the sun until your sunburn heals
 - Put cool cloths on sunburned areas or take a cool bath
 - Put moisturizing lotion on sunburned areas
 - Do not break blisters

COMMUNITY POLICING:

Community policing is a collaboration between the police and the community that identifies and solves community problems.

When you see something, say something to the authorities. Contact me and/or call the St. Tammany Parish Sheriff's Office in order to report criminal matters. Issues of abandoned bikes, abandoned scooters, abandoned vehicles, suspicious persons or activities, speeding, graffiti, criminal damage, or stolen items should all be reported directly to the authorities. Once we know about an incident, we can investigate and take the appropriate action.

The bottom line is, we are all in this together and communication is essential! The more we work together, the safer our community will be.

TRAILHEAD:

Previous problems that have since been reduced or eliminated:

Drug paraphernalia, empty alcoholic beverage containers, criminal damage, kids jumping from the bridges into flood water, theft, and graffiti.

Unfortunately, we've recently experienced repeated incidents of intentional damage to the restrooms at the Trailhead. The plumbing has been intentionally clogged by flushing things into the sewer system that it cannot handle. The walls were damaged. If you see something, say something. Report any damage you see so that an investigation can occur and issues can be addressed Please help us keep this area safe and enjoyable for our town.



DID YOU KNOW:

- The Trailhead and park area are closed from 10:00 PM-5:00 AM. If you are caught in the trailhead or park area when it is closed, you are trespassing. The maximum fine is \$500.00.
- There are cameras all through the park, and the camera system has been instrumental in helping solve crimes.
- At the heart of most of the Trailhead problems are juveniles.

Parents, please know where your kids are and what they are doing.

- A great deal of time, effort, and care has gone into making the trailhead a safe, pleasant, family-oriented area for residents and guests to enjoy. Please help us keep it that way.

STOP SPEEDING!

For more than two decades, speeding has been involved in approximately one-third of all motor vehicle fatalities. In 2020, speeding was a contributing factor in 29% of all traffic fatalities.

Speed also affects your safety even when you are driving at the speed limit but too fast for road conditions, such as during bad weather, when a road is under repair, or in an area at night that isn't well lit.

Speeding endangers not only the life of the speeder, but all of the people on the road around them, including law enforcement officers. It is a problem we all need to help solve.



It's Summertime and it's HOT! ☀️

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, reports that there have been at least 910 Child Hot Car Deaths since 1998. **Summertime changes to daily schedules coupled with high heat make it more likely that children will die from being left in hot vehicles.**

The following tips can help parents lessen the likelihood of this happening:

- Check vehicle for children when exiting.
- Put important items like a handbag or briefcase next to the child when entering the car.
- Keep car doors locked when at home so children can't climb in and become trapped.
- Set alarms on cell phones to remind them to check before entering work.
- Do not leave children in vehicles alone, even for a short time.
- If you see a child alone in a vehicle, make sure the child is okay and responsive. If not, call 911 immediately.
- If the child appears to be okay, attempt to locate the parents; if at a public place, have the facility page the car owner over an intercom system.
- If the child is not responsive and appears to be in distress, attempt to get into the car to assist the child—even if that means breaking a window. Many states, INCLUDING LOUISIANA, have "Good Samaritan" laws that protect people from lawsuits for getting involved to help a person in an emergency.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS: From the Public Works Utility Dept.



From the Kitchen
to the Bathroom



KITCHEN

DO NOT put fats, oil, or grease down your kitchen drain. You can see from the diagram on the right how the blockage progresses over time.



Sewer Blockage Formation

-  The start of a blocked pipe begins when grease and solids collect on the top and sides of the pipe interior.
-  The build-up increases over time when grease and other debris are washed down the drain.
-  Excessive accumulation will restrict the flow of wastewater and can result in a sanitary sewer overflow.

BATHROOM

DO NOT flush your wipes, mop-heads, diapers, cleaning wipes towels, etc. **Please only flush the 3 P's: Pee, Poop, and Toilet Paper.**

A clog takes hours to clear and is costly. Not to mention it puts unnecessary stress on our lift station pumps.





HURRICANE

HURRICANE SEASON STARTED ON JUNE 1 AND ENDS ON NOVEMBER 30.

MAKE A PLAN.

Make sure you and your family are prepared by planning ahead. Write down emergency phone numbers and keep them on the refrigerator or near every phone in your house. Program them into your cell phone, too. Prepare an emergency supply kit. Locate the nearest shelter and different routes you can take to get there from your home.

Pet owners: Pre-identify shelters, a pet-friendly hotel, or an out-of-town friend or relative where you can take your pets in an evacuation. Local animal shelters may be able to offer advice on what to do with your pets if you are asked to evacuate your home.

Gather emergency supplies: During and after a hurricane, you may need supplies to keep your family safe and healthy. Remember that a hurricane could cut off your power and water supply. You also may not be able to travel because roads may be flooded or blocked.

That's why it's best to be prepared—stock up on everything you might need now.

Be sure to prepare the following:

- An emergency food and water supply.
- An emergency medicine supply.
- Emergency power sources such as flashlights (don't forget extra batteries).
- Safety and personal items.
- Charge all devices before you lose power, including extra power banks.
- Gather important documents, including medical documents, wills, passports and personal identification.

Get your home ready: Clear your yard. Make sure there's nothing that could blow around during the storm and damage your home. Move bikes, lawn furniture, grills, propane tanks, and building material inside or under shelter. Cover up windows and doors. Use storm shutters or nail pieces of plywood to the outside window frames to protect your windows. This can help keep you safe from pieces of shattered glass. Fill clean water containers with drinking water. You'll want to do this in case you lose your water supply during the storm. You can also fill up your sinks and bathtubs with water for washing. Check your carbon monoxide (CO) detector's battery to prevent CO poisoning. Be ready to evacuate or stay at home. Always listen to authorities regarding whether you should evacuate or stay at home. If a hurricane is coming, you may hear an order from authorities to evacuate (leave your home). Never ignore an order to evacuate. Even sturdy, well-built houses may not hold up against a hurricane. Staying home to protect your property is not worth risking your health and safety. You may hear an order to stay at home. If driving conditions are dangerous, staying at home might be safer than leaving.


PREPAREDNESS

Get your car ready: Make sure your car is ready before the storm hits. Fill your car's gas tank. Always keep an emergency kit in your car. If you don't own a car, consider making plans with friends or family or call authorities to get a ride if you need to evacuate.

Get your family and pets ready: Go over your emergency plan with your family. Keep checking for updates about the storm. Watch TV, listen to the radio, or check online.

If you need to evacuate: Grab your emergency supply kit and only take what you really need with you (cell phone, chargers, medicines, identification like a passport or license, and cash). Unplug your appliances. Follow the roads that emergency workers recommend even if there's traffic. Other routes might be blocked or flooded. **Never drive through flooded areas—cars and other vehicles can be swept away or may stall in just 6 inches of moving water.**

If you need to stay home: Keep your emergency supply kit in a place you can easily access. Listen to the radio or TV for updates on the hurricane. Stay inside. Even if it looks calm, don't go outside. Wait until you hear or see an official message that the hurricane is over. Sometimes, weather gets calm in the middle of a storm but then quickly gets bad again. Stay away from windows—you could get hurt by pieces of broken glass or flying debris during a storm. Stay in a room with no windows, or go inside a closet. Be ready to leave. If emergency authorities order you to leave or if your home is damaged, you may need to go to a shelter or a neighbor's house.



GENERATOR SAFETY

- DO place your generator outside, more than 20 feet away from windows and doors
- DO NOT place near open windows or doors
- DO NOT use in wet conditions
- DO NOT refuel when hot
- DO NOT use a wall outlet
